Employment/Apprenticeship

If you want to be employed or in an apprenticeship when you leave college you will need to:

- 1. Decide on which job role you would like do you want to do?
- 2. Research the Role you are applying for. What qualifications/skills are needed? Research the company.
- 3. Prepare a CV. Use the Employability Skills worksheet and your research about the job role skills to enhance your CV.
- 4. Search for vacancies. Job offers won't come to you you need to search for them this takes a lot of time and effort and the vacancies will change daily. You might find if you ask parents or friends they might know of a vacancy. Ask relatives basically anyone that you know as this is more likely to secure you a job.
- 5. Apply for a role. Follow the instructions and complete all forms entirely with spell checked, accurate information. Meet the deadline Employers are not flexible -they want reasons to reject you.
- 6. If successful you will need to pass the Selection Process. This can be a simple interview or a complete process. Do your research for your company their website, google search, student chatroom etc. all might help you with the process and types of activities/questions you might get.
- 7. Contract of Employment check it carefully was it what you thought it would be?

Points to consider

Some Level 2 or 3 Apprenticeships pay below the minimum wage - in line with the apprenticeship wage – does this cover travel costs? Will your parents support you?

Some Apprenticeships/Traineeships are advertised in September/October for an August Start. Most companies will have only one month when their jobs are advertised – so you need to keep looking.

This year it might be more difficult to get an apprenticeship as businesses would have been affected by the close down.

- 1. Decide on which Job Role you would like do you want to do?
- If you know then move on to number 2!
- If not then you can undertake some online activities which help match your skills/likes/dislikes to particular job profiles. They are computer programmes and will only react to the information you put in – remember they are NOT personality tests it is OK to say you don't want to work with babies or children it does not make you a bad person.
